## From the Editor

**B** etty Ferra and her mother Edie Morrison founded the Kitchen Kut-Ups in the summer of 1972. I joined in February of 1973. At that time we had only eleven members, playing things like kazoos, washboards, buckets and kitchen utensils (hence our name). I was just a kid of thirty then, well below the required membership age of fifty, but they made an exception for me as they needed an accompanist in the worst way. I would have to do, at least temporarily. I've been with them since.

During that first year Betty and I and a few other members went to Santa Rosa to hear another wellestablished "kitchen band", in what was to be their final year together. I don't recall their name, but they had lots of kazoos. Dozens. Many, many dozens. They didn't have dancers or do a floor show (and, at the time, neither did we) but they played the old standards with the aplomb of a revved up B-47. What really impressed me, though, was that they'd been together for fifteen years.

"Fifteen Years!" I gasped. "Can you imagine doing something like this for fifteen years!"

I'm still not sure I can, but after twenty-five years

we have quite a history by now. In the beginning we entertained at rest homes, lodges, mobile home parks, public schools, and for the "Fun After Fifty" Club from which the Kut-Ups evolved. As we grew we found transporting instruments, equipment and costumes to be more and more of a chore. For some of our smaller engagements we divided the band into three groups and rotated duty.

Our first big public show was at the Sonoma-Marin Fair in Petaluma in 1975. On the 4th of July, 1976, we won first prize in our category for our float entry in the Bi-Centennial parade in Petaluma, and another parade prize that year in Rohnert Park. For the Petaluma parade our band members rode on the back of an enormous flatbed truck decorated

with our red-and-white check colors. I recall the truck driver got lost trying to find the parade, then drove like hell to make up for lost time. There I was, trying to play a large upright piano as it rocked and rolled from side to side the full width of the truck. It was quite an experience, one we all vowed never to repeat.

Then there was the time we played at Marine World, when it was located in Redwood City. We arrived to find NO PIANO! I tried my best to conduct the show while playing everything on the melodica (the instrument with the little one-hand keyboard and blowtube). We had a versatile violinist, but she protested during the performance that her G-string snapped. Betty cried out in exasperation, "You have three other strings, don't you? Use those!"

Then there was THE NIGHTMARE at a lodge in Petaluma (we seemed to have a lot of experiences in Petaluma) where Betty learned the hard way never again to agree to a performance without first checking the hall. There were sixty of us in a dozen or so cars, and our equipment included six accordions, costumes, amplifiers and so on.

There was no place to park. We had to pull the cars up one at a time and unload onto the street, which was dark and narrow. There were no street lights. Then we discovered we were playing on the third floor, and had to ascend a staircase so narrow it would accept only one way traffic. There were other problems, too, such as no dressing rooms (we made do with screens) and a carpeted floor (hellish for tap dancing), but the show went pretty well, considering. And, oh, yes... we had an audience of twelve.

I also remember 1981, when I tried to play a show while stricken with the Hong Kong flu. I was so sick I couldn't lift my head off the piano!

In 1976 the Kut-Ups became a part of the state of California's adult education program, for which Betty and I went to class and acquired our lifetime teaching credentials. The state sponsorship continued until the economy went south, then during the eighties we were supported for a number of years by the city of Rohnert Park, through the Parks and Recreation Department. Then the economy got even tighter, eventually leaving us to sponsor ourselves.

We achieved a milestone of sorts when we appeared, albeit briefly, on national television. On November 12, 1992, segments of our rehearsal appeared on Dan Rather's Evening News Program.

We long ago discontinued traveling to perform. It's just too big of an operation. We now do a big annual show in the summer, for which we rehearse all year. For awhile we were at the Veterans Building in Petaluma, but for the past eight years we've been here at the Dorothy Spreckels Performing Arts Center in Rohnert Park. All our performances sell out well in advance.

It's been quite a ride. I wouldn't trade it for anything.
